

## Frequently Asked Questions

## What was the level of community support in the Phase I referendum?

Of those residents who went to the polls, 75% voted in favor of Phase I

#### Is Phase One on time and on budget?

Yes! As of September 2016, 45% of the construction of the new Orchard Hill School has been completed. Our target of substantial completion for May 2017 remains on schedule. The project is adhering to the budget approved by our residents.

## The original plan contemplated that PRS would undergo a "renovate-like-new" construction process. Why did the professionals recommend new construction?

The rationale for new construction includes: new information from the state regarding its contemplation of eliminating the "renovate-like-new" category; guidance from our project professionals and experts; site limitations; equity among schools; ADA compliance; and anticipated hazardous material abatement issues, specifically the unknown risks for increased costs associated with renovating a building of the PRS era.

## What will happen to Wapping School when it closes?

The Board of Education will turn Wapping School over to the town in the summer of 2017. The current plan is for the Parks and Recreation Department to move their operations to the current Wapping School. This is a win-win for our community as there are competing demands for space at the Community Center. The move would provide Parks and Recreation with space desirable for supporting its mission and simultaneously open up more space at the Community Center for seniors. The Board does, however, plan to request continued use of a portion of Wapping School to address educational needs at the high school. Specifically, there is need for additional space to support career pathways coursework. In addition, an alternative education program is part of the Board's 2015-2018. Strategic Plan and the proximity of Wapping to the high school would make this an ideal location.

## What will happen to the current Orchard Hill building after the new school opens?

The current Orchard Hill facility will serve as "swing space" in support of our Ten-Year Elementary Facilities Master Plan. Both Philip R. Smith and Pleasant Valley Schools will require the use of swing space while their buildings undergo construction. At the close of the master plan, the Board of Education will turn over the building to the town and the Town Council will decide at that time whether the building should be razed or repurposed.

## What if our student population exceeds projected enrollment?

The State's reimbursement formula is predicated on building to a capacity that does not exceed the projected highest enrollment within an eight-year time frame from the date the application is submitted. We are limited to those parameters for design enrollment. The district works with professional demographers who analyze a wide variety of factors when calculating the projections.

## What do new schools offer that our existing schools do not?

Among other factors, new schools offer ADA compliance, modern technology, enhanced school security features, more efficient utilities, environmentally conscious design, improved indoor air quality, spaces designed for current instructional strategies, safer traffic pattern designs, and climate-controlled spaces.

#### How does the community at large benefit from new schools?

High quality schools protect property values. Realtors routinely cite the quality of our school system as a vehicle for promoting home ownership in South Windsor. In addition, the plan offers some win-wins for those seeking improvements associated with dedicated space for senior citizens and for the recreation department. Our school facilities are used extensively by many community groups that meet in our facilities when school is not in session. These groups will also benefit from modern, climate controlled, ADA compliant school buildings.

## How are school construction projects funded?

In Connecticut, local school construction projects are typically paid for through a combination of bonded debt issued by the State of Connecticut and the municipality building the school. The municipality pays for its share of the design and construction costs, typically by issuing short-term notes. As construction continues, the State of Connecticut begins reimbursing the municipality through "progress payments" for its share of project costs that are deemed to be reimbursable. When construction is complete and the municipality has received all eligible reimbursement, the short-term notes are converted to long-term municipal bonds, ranging from a 20 to 30-year term. The reimbursement rate varies from town to town, ranging from a low of 10% to a high of 80% as determined by project type and relative wealth rank of the town.

## What is our reimbursement rate?

For both Phase II projects, which we expect to submit to the state in 2017, the state's maximum reimbursement rate for new construction in South Windsor is 37.14%. The state's reimbursement rate for new construction for Phase I is 34.64%.

# Will I know in advance of voting in the Spring 2017 referendum what impact Phase Two will have on my taxes?

Yes. Town Manager Matthew Galligan, in consultation with Independent Bond Investment Consultants, will calculate the tax impact to South Windsor taxpayers based on the initial estimate of the cost for Phase II. This information will be published in a community newsletter which will be mailed to all South Windsor homes.

#### **About this Document**

This document outlines a plan for addressing our aging elementary schools and includes a timeline for consolidating from five elementary schools to four. Without question, changes in enrollment, changes in reimbursement rates, changes in the economy, and changes in education legislation could alter this Master Plan or its intended timeline. While variables may arise, we believe a transparent and detailed proposal of a ten-year scenario, based on the information available to us today, allows for a conceptual long-range plan for the community to consider. The first edition of this document was published in October 2013 and updated in September 2015. This edition was updated in September 2016 and reflects refreshed enrollment projections as well as more specific details resparding construction, Phase II, and project milestones.
